Vinci Prize, Mr. Christophe Viellard, President of the Henokiens Association and Mr. François Saint Bris, President of the Château du Clos Lucé, last residence of Leonardo in Amboise, France, awarded the second "**Leonardo da Vinci Prize**" to Professor Hans Georg Näder, President of the firm "Otto Bock HealthCare GmbH".

The firm "Otto Bock HealthCare GmbH", founded in 1919 by Mr. Otto Bock, is today an important German industrial group specialized in medical techniques intended for improving

freedom of movement for persons of reduced mobility. Since its creation, it has devoted all its energy to innovating in the design and manufacturing of high-quality products intended to help the handicapped recover quality of life and independence.

This is what is meant by its motto: "Quality for Life."



Known and admired world-wide, with a presence in 44 countries, the firm Otto Bock, has a turnover of almost 700 million Euros and 5000 employees. It has based its success on solid traditions going back to its roots and on dynamic and responsible growth.

Since the Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea in 1988, Otto Bock has been the official partner of the Paralympic Games.



In his speech, Christophe Viellard underlined the extent to which the firm Otto Bock's attachment to its local roots has allowed it to keep ever present in mind the importance of making globally responsible moral decisions. The success of this enterprise in the service of the handicapped has in no way prevented it from considering that ethics concerns not only the family, the company or the nation, but the entire world and all human beings.
